A Message from our Executive Director



In a year characterized by social unrest and sometimes violent protests, not just across the country, but also on our doorstep, the onset of a global pandemic, and the most emotionally charged political landscape in decades, you could be forgiven for thinking that nothing good came out of FY2019–2020. It is easy to get bogged down in a near-constant barrage of negative news.

With that said, VCPI is wired to view the world through a “glass is half full” lens. Through this lens, we have observed that the heartbreaking events that have occurred across the country have spurred important and powerful conversations between our communities and public safety professionals. The extreme and multi-faceted tragedy of COVID-19 has also been marked with a plethora of examples of neighbors helping neighbors, creativity and caring, and heroism.

Like many others, VCPI recognized that the challenges of FY19–20 also brought about opportunities and VCPI rose to the occasion – working relentlessly to squeeze every ounce of good out of this year that we could. We offered opportunities for communities, public safety professionals, and policy makers to come together and discuss their viewpoints on social issues, and when the pandemic hit, VCPI rallied from our dining room tables and living rooms to make sure that our training and resources were readily available and moving forward. As a result, we have plenty of good news to share about this past year!

Some of our highlights this year include:

- Thousands of law enforcement officers across the country received training on critical issues such as violence prevention, ethical decision making, community policing, and much more through VCPI’s in-person and online training initiatives.
- After extensive enhancements to the Virginia VINE system and an intense public awareness effort, a record number of nearly 100,000 victims and others signed up to receive custody status notifications on offenders in Virginia’s local and regional jails, using the information to enhance their personal safety and support their peace of mind.
- Community members and public safety professionals from over 400 cities joined together at VCPI training events in 30 states to discuss ways they could work together to prevent violent extremism in our communities.

These are just a few of the many successes our team cultivated in FY2019–2020. As you read through this annual report, I invite you to share in our excitement over the impact we made and the groundwork we laid in our pursuit of providing innovative learning opportunities and powerful resources that improve public safety, one person at a time.

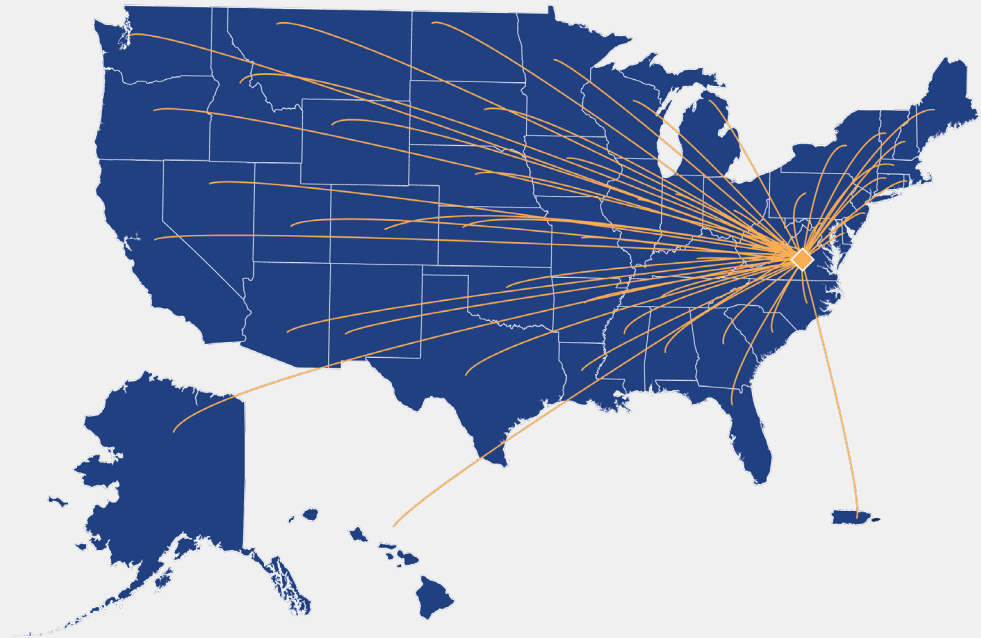

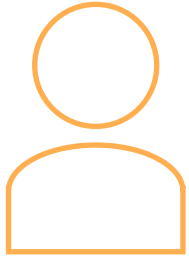

Program Highlights

COPS Office Training Portal

This year, VCPI continued to maintain, enhance, and promote this eLearning portal housing COPS Office-funded public safety courses and resources.



Additionally, VCPI completed the Portal's first successful advertising campaign using social media, search engines, magazines, and e-newsletters to promote the Portal's no-cost resources to thousands of public safety professionals around the country. The campaign exceeded expectations, leading to over 10,000 new visitors and 600 new registrations in two months.

From launching a successful pilot advertising campaign, to improving user accessibility, to adding numerous courses and resources, 2019-2020 was the Portal's most successful year to date.

Program Highlights

STRIVE: Strategic, Tactical, Resilient Interdiction of Violent Extremeism

VCPI completed its work on the STRIVE program, which brought public safety professionals and community members together for two days of collaborative discussions on how to work together to prevent violent extremism in our communities.



This program represented the largest grant that VCPI had been awarded since its founding in 1997. Despite having to end the delivery of in-person events ahead of schedule due to COVID-related complications, the program was nevertheless a major success.

VCPI also completed the development of an online version of STRIVE that will be available on its website later this year.

Virginia VINE

VCPI continues to administer the Virginia VINE program, which provides survivors of crime with critical updates about the custody status of their offender.



This year, VCPI launched a new digital campaign to raise awareness about the VINE program across Virginia. With a focus on community members and public safety professionals alike, the ads were served 4,000,000 times to English and Spanish speaking audiences across the Commonwealth.

Additionally, VCPI secured funding to expand current VINE services to include providing notifications for protective orders. However, this new spending has been temporarily suspended due to the pandemic.

Development Initiatives **2019 - 2020**

This year, VCPI worked on developing and designing forward-thinking programs and services for public safety nationwide.

Development Initiatives

VCRIME: Violent Crime Reduction: Information, Messaging, and Engagement (BJA)

VCPI developed the Community Safety Collaborative (a national advisory board) and began conducting market research for VCRIME, a national campaign to raise awareness about the shared responsibility between community members and public safety professionals in reducing violent crime.

Measuring What Matters: Building Trust and Legitimacy (BJA)

VCPI continued development of this online resource for law enforcement agencies nationwide focusing on the reduction of violent crime, organizational culture, officer safety and wellness, and measuring and sustaining success.

BJA National Training and Technical Assistance (BJA NTTAC)

Through this program, VCPI provided crime prevention training to agencies requesting services. Additionally, VCPI continues to be an NTTAC Provider for BJA's Prosecution Assessment TTA Program.

New Curriculum for the National Association of School Resource Officers (NASRO)

VCPI continued its development of an introductory-level School Resource Officer eLearning course.



Development Initiatives



VCPI eLearn Center (VCPI)

VCPI expanded its support of the public safety community through the enhancement of the VCPI eLearn Center and through the development of exceptional online training and resources.



VCPI Strategic Development (VCPI)

VCPI launched VCPI Insights, a new subsidiary that will enable VCPI to compete for additional grants and contracts. Additionally, VCPI adopted new vision and mission statements as part of its strategic plan.



Virginia VINE Services (VA-DCJS)

VCPI continued to administer, manage, and promote this statewide automated victim notification system that provides victims of crime with information and resources vital to their safety.

STRIVE: Strategic, Tactical, Resilient Interdiction of Violent Extremism (USDHS)

VCPI concluded its work on this national training program designed to enhance the capacity of communities to counter violent extremism through the implementation of community policing principles and practices.



VSI Certification Program (VSI)

VCPI continued to administer this certification program in partnership with the Virginia Sheriffs' Institute.

Development Initiatives



COPS Office Training Portal (COPS)

VCPI continued to maintain, enhance, and promote this eLearning portal housing COPS Office-funded public safety courses and resources. Additionally, VCPI continued developing new content through its Online Training Development program that will be hosted on both the Portal as well as the VCPI eLearn Center.

Pathways to Resiliency: Preventing Violent Radicalization Through Community Policing (COPS)

VCPI continued development of this online, national demonstration initiative depicting the efforts of law enforcement agencies in building resiliency to prevent radicalization to violence.

National Critical Response & Recovery TTA Provider (COPS)

As a Training and Technical Assistance Provider, VCPI enhanced the capacity of law enforcement agencies in their response to critical incidents and emerging issues.

CHP Cohort Support: Training & Technical Assistance Program (COPS)

VCPI completed its work on this national training and technical assistance effort supporting COPS Hiring Program (CHP) grantees in four COPS Office CHP Cohorts: Gun Violence/Homicide; School-based; Trust; and Homeland Security.



Development Initiatives

Contemporary Community Policing: a National Law Enforcement Training Initiative (COPS)

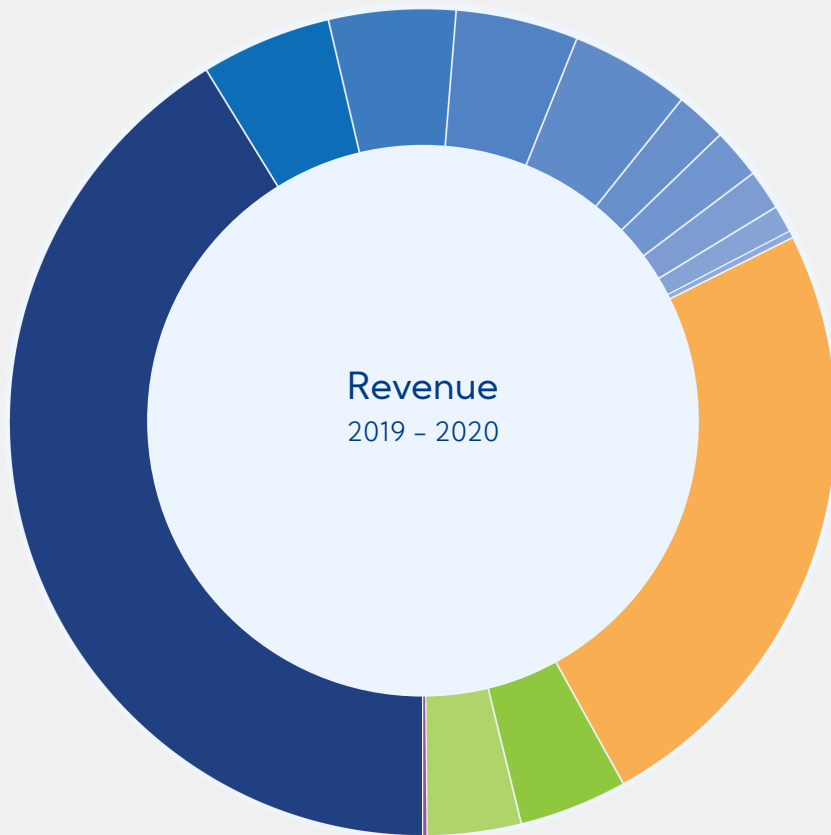
VCPI launched this initiative supporting the advancement of community policing nationwide through the delivery of an instructor development program.

VCPI continued its work with a national advisory board in developing an interactive learning program focused on applying broken windows theory, as it was originally intended, to a broad array of modern public safety issues.

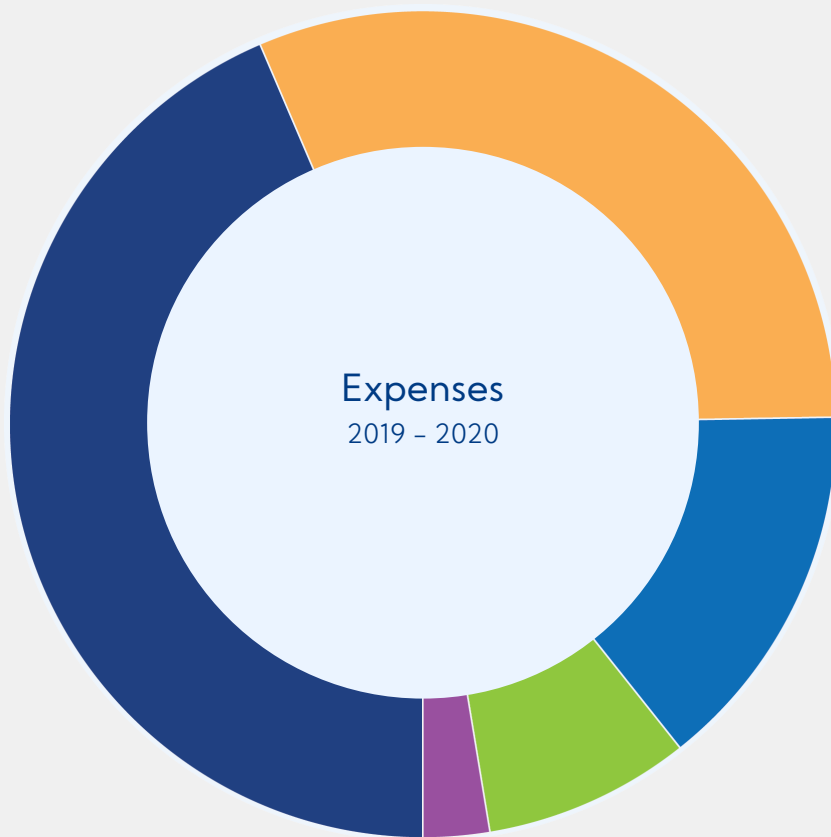
